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An Open Book - What is your most treasured possession?

Quick question – What is your most treasured possession or the thing you wouldn't live without? We are currently enjoying Lent when some people give up things and focus on God. This year I have given up caffeine and surviving (so obviously can live without it)! We all have things we are attached to and would rather not be without, but how important is your bible?? It sort of reminds me of the parable of the pearl of great price and how a man was willing to sell everything he had because that pearl is far more valuable than anything he already has. The Kingdom of heaven and a relationship with God is worth far more than any earthly thing we might treasure and worth everything we might give up for it, but how do we find out about this treasure we are offered? Through God's word – the Holy Bible.

I have been recently reminded of Queen Elizabeth II's coronation. As part of the ceremony she was presented with a bible and told '**Here is the most valuable thing that the world can afford**'. As a Christian I have several copies of the bible in different translations and here we are told it is the most valuable thing the world can afford – not because it is of a high price, you can pick up a copy of the bible for a few pounds, but because of its amazing and life changing content.

2 Timothy 3:16 says All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful to teach us what is true and to make us realize what is wrong in our lives. It corrects us when we are wrong and teaches us to do what is right. (NLT).

That is what makes the bible so valuable – I know of no other book that can shape our lives the way that the bible does and all because it is God's very own words – given to us so we can know Him better.

Recently, I was privileged enough to go on a training course called *Understanding Christianity*. This is a new resource that has been recently written to support the teaching of RE in any school and is aimed at 4-14 year olds. The aim of the resource is to help children and young people to understand Christianity by rooting it in the bible (increasing biblical literacy), helping children to develop the skills they need to be able to make sense of biblical text and see the impact it has on the lives of believers and then make connections with their own lives. Did

anyone else notice how that fits quite closely to what NISCU aims to do? I don't know about you but the idea of children not only being told stories from the Bible, but being taught how to read it and make sense of it for themselves is very exciting to me. We have this amazingly valuable book and I hope it is your desire as much as mine to see this book open and being used well in all our schools.

Please pray with us that many of the local schools as well as lots nationally will take up this resource and really see how priceless the inspired word of God really is not just for Christians but for themselves too.

An Open invitation - to children throughout the world.

Jesus said "*Let the children come to me. Don't stop them! For the Kingdom of God belongs to those who are like these children.*" Mark 10 v 14

This verse is a constant reminder to me that in everything I do I have a responsibility to make sure that children feel encouraged and enabled to understand that God is interested in them and that I do not put anything in the way to make it too hard for them to see the good news of Jesus' love for them. Of course, there are certain limitations within the work we do but I am constantly aware of the privilege I have of being able to show Jesus to so many children and young people in North Cumbria.



This term I had the fun of a teaching series in a school entitled *Christianity around the world*. Due to numerous international contacts that I (and my friends) have we were able to investigate some of the similarities and differences between how Christianity 'looks' in the UK and in Iran, China, Burkina Faso, Romania, Mongolia and Russia. The impact of finding out about the persecuted church across the world, and the differences in style and freedom in some of the churches was obvious. The children were able to express their surprise at the restrictions in some countries, and their gratitude that they have the freedom to make choices here. Watching the class as they listened to a Russian Orthodox chant of The Lord's Prayer was possibly one of the most powerful moments I had – one child said 'I felt a really strong peace while we were listening to it, I really liked it.' The power of God's word is not limited by our understanding of the language! I hope to be able to roll out the series to other schools so that more children can understand that although the

working out of 'church' might be different, the God we serve and the Jesus who died to bring Salvation is the same for Christians throughout the world, and it is THAT which makes us a family, part of the Body of Christ.

Closer to home, partnering with other Christians from a variety of churches confirms that need to belong to the Body even more. A recent meeting in Wigton demonstrated clearly to me that, when we partner with churches in the work we do the Gospel can be so much more effective, and so many more schools can be supported, there are exciting times ahead!

At each monthly prayer meeting it is so evident that without the faithful prayer of so many supporters this work would be less impactful – it is an honour to be a small part of the bigger picture and to know that the work I do is supported by so many others. You too are part of the Body, and in God's love we work together for Him... THANK YOU!
